 - ...in an emergency, there are always trained individuals nearby, ready to use their Red Cross skills to save lives.

Outreach

- Definition:
 - Outreach is the action of reaching out to others to get involved and take part in an organization.
- Who do I reach out to?
 - Local American Red Cross region
 - Students at your school
 - Members in the community who you think can help you advance your Club
- Why is networking important?
 - Networking is the action of developing relationships and connections with like-minded individuals. This is an essential tool to help you find opportunities and advance your organization and/or yourself as you look for recommendations.

Incentives

- Definition:
 - Incentives are objects or things used to motivate and encourage people to do something.
- Ideas:
 - Gifts
 - American Red Cross merchandise, shirts, bags, candy, giftcards, etc.
 - Social Media Spotlights
 - Shoutout a member of your organization by letting others know their accomplishments with your organization
 - Graduation Cords
 - If specific requirements are met, then a member could be eligible to receive a red cord to wear to graduation

- Answer any issues, questions, or concerns!
 - Volunteer Connection
 - Help create a welcoming and safe space
- DON'T be afraid to collaborate for events, activities, or fundraisers
 - School, Clubs, ASB, local chapter

Plan, Promote, and Execute

- <u>Activity Guides</u> provided by the National Youth Council
 - Seek approval or advice from your advisor or local region
- Committees
 - Blood Drive, National Youth Involvement Month, and major events
- Active Member Engagement
 - Scheduled Club meetings (e.g. every other Friday from 4:00–5:00 p.m.)
 - Involvement in School events and making flyers (I use Canva)
 - Member recognition

Overall Tips for a Successful and Productive Club

- Use your members, delegate
- Give them opportunities to lead themselves
- Use their ideas and feedback to improve and build on the club
